The nature around Nuuk - Winter (January to March)

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 \boldsymbol{I} n January the days are short. The sun is low in the sky, and it often disappears behind the mountains.

But the thin layer of snow on the mountains surrounding the city and the snow in the streets reflect the sunrays during the day and make it much brighter. The rays from the low pass through a great atmosphere in the early after-noon, and the atmosphere lights up in fantastic colours. You can colours in all shades from pink to red and orange.

At night, the stars sparkles clearly in the pitch-black Arctic sky, and almost every night we astonished watch the green waves of the green northern lights across the sky.

The life in the nature continues. The hunger drives the ravens and the sea gulls into the town, where they forage everywhere, there just may give a touch of food. When I throw small pieces of bread out from the balcony the hungry birds come from all corners to get a share of the limited meal.

Otherwise the birds are foraging in the tidal zone along the fiord or from icebergs and ice floes out on *the fiord.*

The large birds of prey also arrive into the town in the first months of the year. It is the gyr falcon and the white-tailed eagle.

The Gyr falcon arrives without moving the wings gliding through the valley. It is an elegant flyer. All the other bird species suddenly becomes quiet and hides from this amazing flyer.

The white-tailed eagle is easier to spot. As soon as the ravens catch sight of the eagle, they are very eager to start teasing the huge bird. *In the countryside around Nuuk* the winter is severe. When the snow has fallen, the municipality establishes ski tracks out in the landscape surrounding the town, and the snowmobiles can transport people too quickly around the countryside. The snow form fantastic shapes. The low sun is playing with the shadows and highlights the sculptures of the snow drifts created by wind.

On the fjord only the professional hunters and fishermen are active. The small boats and dinghies still supply the town with fish, birds and seals.

The whales are long ago swum to the south, but often I watch flocks of seals, passing the town out at the fiord set out to unknown targets further inside the fiord or on the way out to the outer skerries towards the Davis Strait.



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
