Nuuk is a great place to experience extreme weather. Violent hurricanes, foehn winds from the Ice Sheet and blizzards characterize the weather of the town.

All traffic out of town was cancelled owing to the difficult situation with wind speeds of thirty to forty meters per second and more, and poor visibility due to larger and larger amounts of falling snow. The police advised to ornit all traffic. The roads were wet and slippery. Several cars had already crashed.

The day after in the afternoon the wind had not went down, and the snowfall continued. We ventured on to a drive in the car. Good snow tyres resulted in a good road holder. The car stood firm, even though the wind was freshening. Around in the town, we saw several cars that were wrecked.
