Some people believe that the qivitoqs in their lonely lives on the conditions of the nature achieve highly developed senses and supernatural abilities. They seem immortal, and a person, who meets a qivittoq, often experiences that the qivitoq speaks an ancient primitive language and he is dressed in ancient skin clothes.

Maybe a qivittoq again approaches to the town sheltered by the darkness and the driving fog?
